

## Report to the Governing Body for period 2016/17 Ayresome Primary School

## **IMPACT OF PUPIL PREMIUM**

The Pupil Premium is an element of school funding aimed at narrowing the gap in attainment between certain disadvantaged groups of pupils and those who are more well off. In 2016/17 funding was calculated on the basis of:

- **↓** £1,320 per pupil of primary-school age
- # £935 per pupil of secondary-school age
- \$1,900 per pupil for looked-after children who:
- ♣ have been looked after for 1 day or more are adopted
- ♣ leave care under a Special Guardianship Order or a Residence Order

The funding is provided to schools, which decide how best to spend this according to local needs.

This year our school budget included a total Pupil and Service Premium of £480,749 (14.8% of our overall revenue budget) Below is a summary of the way we have used this funding to support our pupils' learning. (Note: information related to individual pupils remains confidential).
